Today, in an extraordinarily generous display of teamwork, Thelma B. Lee and the Harris family gifted more than 3 acres of riverside land to the City of Boise for the creation of the Golda Harris Nature Preserve. Located immediately downstream of Marianne Williams Park, the Golda Harris Nature Preserve will provide the public with a quiet and reflective sanctuary and preserve in perpetuity healthy floodplain, wetland and riparian habitat.

Preservation of well-functioning areas like the Golda Harris Nature Preserve are recommended in the Boise River Enhancement Plan (http://boiseriverenhancement.net/page/river-plan) because they provide multiple ecosystem benefits.

Teamwork has also been making a difference in the City of Boise's Ann Morrison Park where volunteers from Big Brothers Big Sisters and ENEL Green Energy have worked with Idaho Rivers United, the Boise River Enhancement Network and Boise City Parks and Recreation to enhance riparian habitat. In 2014, Big Brother Big Sisters planted cottonwood trees and spread grass-killing mulch to widen the riparian buffer. On October 16, 2015, a hard-working team from ENEL Green Energy, sawed down and yanked out Russian olive trees and other invasive plants opening up space for native species including willows and cottonwoods.

On November 3, Boise City voters can ensure that more Boise River wetlands, floodplains and riparian areas are protected by voting YES on the Clean Water and Open Space ballot measure - the ultimate team effort.

We all win when we team up for the Boise River.
