2012 HIGHLIGHTS

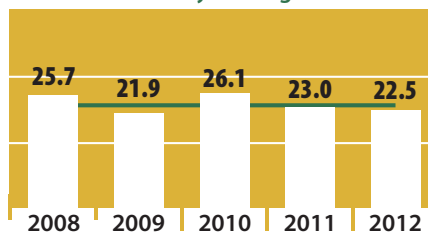

MESSAGE FROM CHIEF BORGQUIST

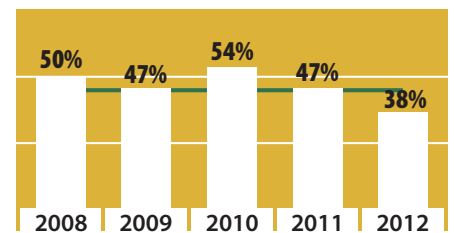

RAPID RESPONSE

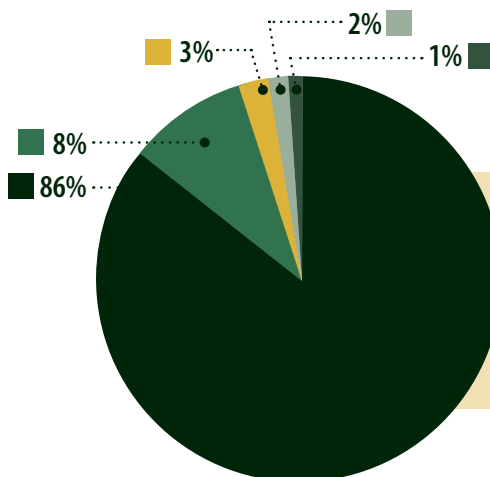


On average, Eagle deputies took 3 minutes and 47 seconds to respond to high-priority emergency calls.
