He has worked as a jail deputy and patrol deputy but says, with a smile, that he is "at home" in Star where he is committed to helping keep the city one of the safest in the Treasure Valley.


Star's low crime rate makes it one of the safest communities in the Treasure Valley!

In Spring 2008, we surveyed Star residents about the top law enforcement issue in their neighborhoods. More than half (65%) reported property crimes was their biggest concern.

We listened. City of Star Police stepped up security checks, targeted juvenile curfew enforcement through the summer months and offered more education to citizens about how to protect themselves and their property.

Law enforcement agencies in Idaho report crime within their jurisdictions to the Idaho State Police under the National Incident-Based Reporting System which has standard definitions, rules and guidelines for reporting specific crimes in three categories:

- Person Crimes = murder, manslaughter, rape/sodomy, assault, intimidation, and kidnapping offenses
- Property Crimes = robbery, burglary, larceny/theft, arson, destruction of property, counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, blackmail, and stolen property offenses
- Society Crimes = drugs/narcotics, gambling, pornography, prostitution, and weapons law violations

This program provides reliable statistics for law enforcement agencies and informs the public about the nature of crimes committed in Idaho.



Calls for Service

Star deputies responded to 1,178 calls for service in 2009. These are calls made to ACSO dispatchers from citizens requesting help. The most common calls for service were related to complaints about animal problems or to check on a person's well-being. The average time it took deputies to respond to high-priority emergency calls was 3 minutes and 47 seconds.


Proactive Policing

Just as important as our response to emergencies is the time your deputies spend on proactive policing conducting traffic stops, checking local businesses or construction sites for suspicious activity and educating the community about ways to prevent crime and protect themselves. We know that when we increase security checks, the number of property crimes like vandalism and theft go down.

Our 2008 citizen survey showed 35% of Star residents wanted to see more patrols and an increased police presence in the community. Another 14% requested deputies spend more time on traffic enforcement. Star deputies have more than tripled the amount of time they spend on proactive policing in the last five years.



Almost a quarter of Star residents tell us they are concerned about traffic issues in the community. Star saw half as many crashes in 2009 as in the year before. Of the 11 crashes investigated, nine (82%) resulted in property damage and two (18%) caused injuries to people.


In an effort to reduce the number of traffic crashes, City of Star Police use grant-supported directed patrols and saturation patrols to encourage drivers to avoid speeding and aggressive driving.

Star Police operated on \$474,184 from October 2008 to September 2009 with 86% of that money used to pay deputies. The remainder went to vehicles. equipment and operational costs like building and utility fees, training and computers.

In addition to paid contract services, the Ada County Sheriff's Office provides



crime scene investigation and lab services; specialized K-9, SWAT and narcotics response teams; records management services; and human resources to recruit the best deputies and ensure they are properly trained. The ACSO also provides financial services for purchasing and budgeting along with law enforcement planning beyond the crime analysis services included in the budget.

The contract with the ACSO also includes a "Shared Services Credit" that encourages County and Star deputies to respond to calls for service in each other's jurisdiction if they are the closest unit. This creates quicker response times and allows for immediate back-up during emergency calls. All crimes reported in Star are investigated by ACSO detectives.

Contract policing is a cost-effective way for the City of Star to have a reliable, well-trained and independent police force at the lowest possible cost to taxpayers. The cost of law enforcement was \$79 per Star resident in 2009, compared to nearly \$200 for residents of other Treasure Valley communities.1
