Diagnostic Characteristics

- Erect winter annual; varies from 1-3 feet tall
- Plants exist as basal rosettes until flower stems develop in spring
- Stem leaves have a coarse-rough texture, are alternate, and finely dissected
- Flower heads are slender and urnshaped; are pink to purple and consist of only disk flowers
- Seeds are black-brown with a ring of dark bristly hairs at the point of attachment, giving it the appearance of a fishing dry fly; similar in size to a wheat seed

Background

- Native to the Mediterranean region
- Inhabits rangelands, forests, rights-ofway, dry south facing slopes, and pastures
- Reproduces by seed
