Scrophulariaceae, the figwort family Category: CONTAINMENT









Diagnostic Characteristics

- Perennial; grows up to 3 feet tall
- Stems are usually not branched
- Leaves are linear, sessile, and frequently appearing whorled or opposite
- Flowers are bright, yellow or whitish, showy, snapdragon-like, and have an orange throat

Background

- Native to Europe; introduced as an ornamental
- Inhabits disturbed areas, rights-ofway, cultivated fields, grasslands, and gardens
- Reproduces by extensive root systems and seeds
- Will hybridize with Dalmatian toadflax
- Plant contains a poison that could be toxic to livestock if ingested in sufficient quantities
